

How big is the Thames at Oxford?

The Thames at Oxford is 150 feet (46 metres) wide. Reinforced by three tributaries from the north--the Rivers Windrush, Evenlode, and Cherwell--it swings southward past the woods of Nuneham to the market town of Abingdon. There it collects the River Ock, which drains the Vale of White Horse.
